From farm to table



Doing his part for public safety

"The most important thing is to maintain a positive mindset," said Ng Ruihe, a planner in the Development Control Group who remained unfazed by the challenges from his involvement in safe distancing operations.

Besides collating data and surfacing cases from daily operations, Ruihe also works with Safe Distancing Ambassadors (SDAs) to ensure businesses implement the SafeEntry system to aid contact tracing efforts.

"There are always different opinions on the ground and we have to listen to people's concerns, and be patient in explaining to them the spirit of the measures." He added that empathy is an important quality that should be

applied to SDA work, as well as to all aspects of life.













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
